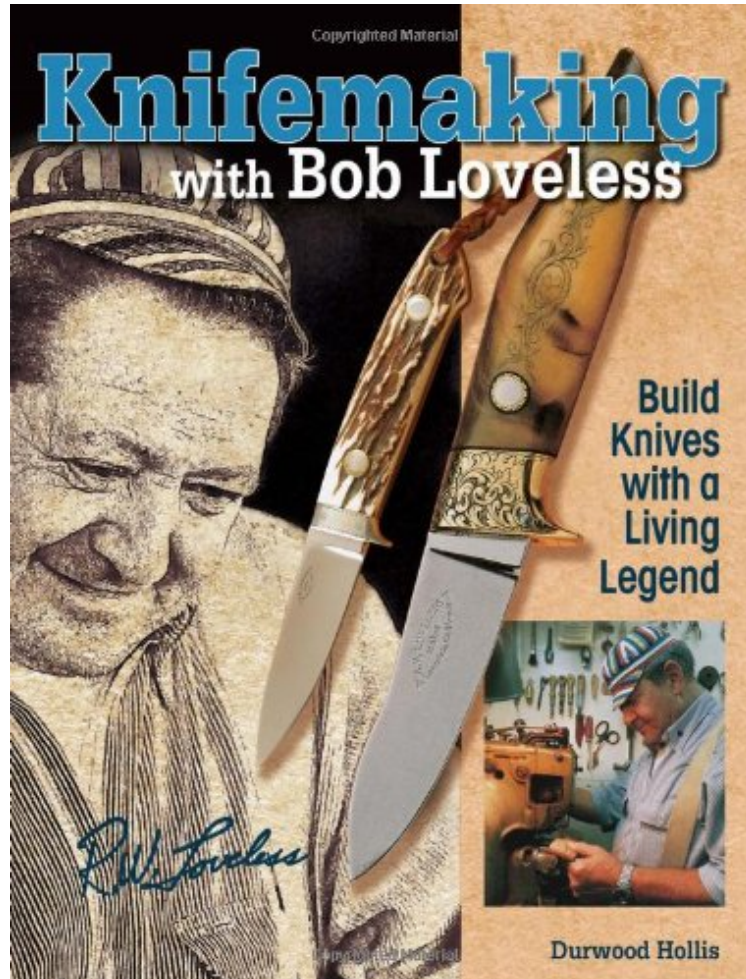

Zeronian I was really hoping that this book would pick up where the section on Loveless knives in "How to Make Knives" left off, but it was not to be. While the pictures are very nice, the technical details were lacking. There were some editorial mistakes as well. One picture caption refers to a "wood" handled knife which is clearly micarta. There are a couple repeated references to "refrigerate oil" which should read "refrigeration oil" what Loveless used to quench the first knife he made. That the story was told twice in the book was odd too. Anyway from a historical standpoint it's ok, but if you're looking to actually make a knife, there are better references.

Blade aficionados will revel in color photos from inside Bob Loveless' knife shop, and of his knives, as author Durwood Hollis details Loveless' stock-removal method of knife making, tools of the trade, designs, heat treating and tempering of blade steel, handles, sheaths, knife care and maintenance, and tips for the field. Bob Loveless, a member of the Blade Magazine Cutlery Hall Of Fame(c), passed away on Sept. 2, 2010, at the age of 81. He was known as the father of the modern custom knife movement, the man who popularized the dropped hunter, Big Bear sub-hilt fighter and other knives, and, along with Richard Barney, co-wrote How To Make Knives, the precursor to this book.
