

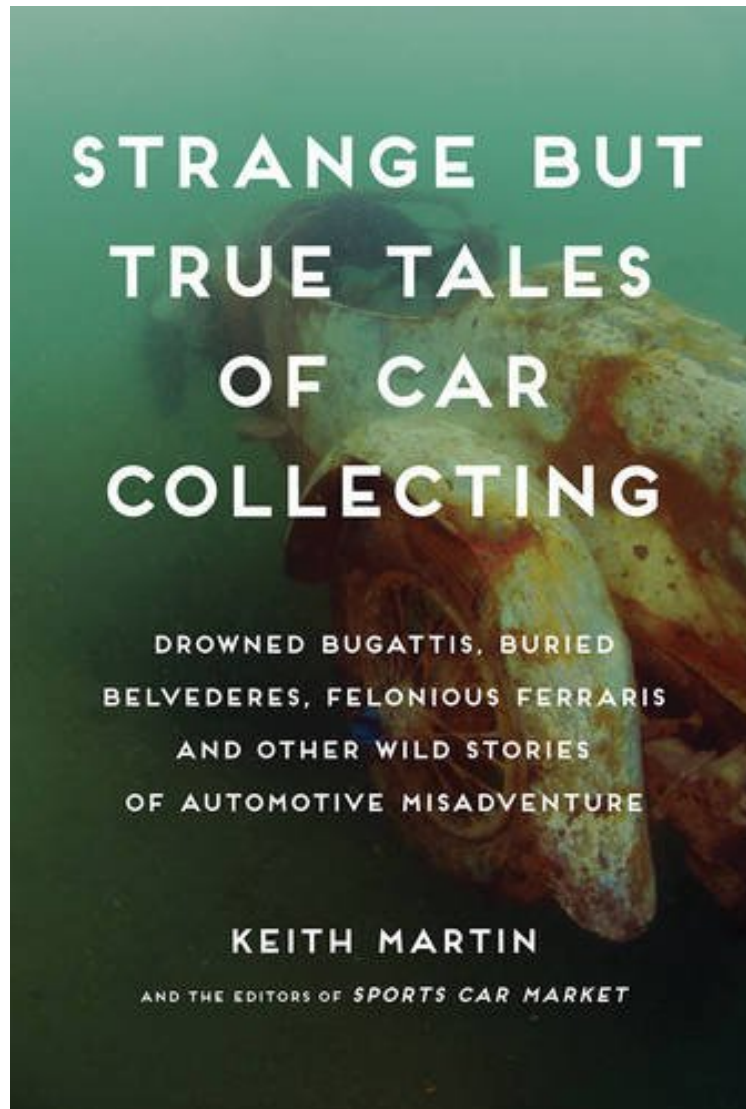

The first few bites are fine but soon your taste buds are overloaded. The book is poorly structured. It needs more pictures and fewer words. Almost one third of the chapters have no pictures of the car(s) that are the subject of the chapter. Most chapters include too much extraneous information and not enough pictures. It appears the author was forced to pad the book with extra text to make a page count. Some of the topics are also a stretch. Why is the Amphicar included? The chapter on the Chrysler Norseman includes two pictures of Andrea Doria but none of the car. It includes three useless pages detailing the timeline of the sinking of the ship. The chapter on the AnyCar, used by a bank to promote car loans, includes pictures of only one of the three versions of the car but gives a history of both car loans in general and the Manufacturers Hanover Trust. 1 of
